Nine Key tips for approaching schools and school districts to advance recycling in schools

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- 1. Assess what is happening now and in the past five years
 - a. Talk to teachers, principals, students, custodians and administrators
 - b. Find out who is in charge
 - i. Who would be making a decision to enhance or expand current efforts
 - ii. Who manages the current waste collection contract
 - c. Are there any goals, standards or mandates for recycling in schools in your city, county or state
 - d. Does the school district have a point person for environmental or sustainability initiatives?
- 2. Identify allies and supporters
 - a. School Board
 - b. Administration
 - c. City Council
 - d. PTA or other parent groups
 - e. Student environmental clubs
 - f. Faculty
- 3. Develop fact sheets and test them with various gatekeepers- Is this what is happening?
- 4. Define your role: Explain the value that your affiliate would bring to a partnership with a school or a school district to advance recycling.
- 5. Develop rough projections of costs and benefits
- 6. Bring in speakers from other districts
- 7. Ask to make presentations to City Council or to the School Board at televised meetings; Have students be part of the presentation
- 8. Emphasize the economic, environmental and educational benefits
- 9. Broaden the approach by considering a "Green Schools" policy or goal
